





## NGOs CALL ON EUROPEAN COMMISSION TO BAN SINGLE-USE PLASTIC BAGS DURING 2013 INTERNATIONAL BAG-FREE DAY

Brussels, July 3, 2013 – Zero Waste Europe, GAIA, and Surfrider Foundation Europe called for a ban on single-use plastic bags today, on international plastic bag-free day. The organisations urged the European Commission to ensure the necessary steps to restrict their use, during the review of the packaging waste legislation in 2014.

The fourth edition of international plastic bag-free day sees groups from all over the world organizing activities to raise awareness on the environmental impact of single-use plastic bags and to demand that governments act to stop marine littering. Single-use plastic bags accounted for 92.5% of the 95.5 billion carrier bags used in the EU in 2010, and for 73% of the waste collected along the Tuscany coast<sup>1</sup>.

**Joan-Marc Simon from Zero Waste Europe said:** "We regret that the European Commission is taking so long to take a decision on the issue of single-use plastic bags. The negative effects of such lack of action are visible to everyone; the EC should restrict the use of single-use plastic bags in the coming review of waste and packaging waste legislation".

**Antidia Citores from Surfrider Foundation Europe said:** "Single use plastics bags: 12 minutes in your hands, centuries harming our seas and oceans. In 2011, a European consultation showed overwhelming support for a ban on single use plastic bags and so far in 2013, 10,000 people have signed our call for an EU ban on disposable plastic bags. We hope the 4<sup>th</sup> edition of the international plastic bag-free day will convince the EC to ban them and end this environmental nonsense."

Plastic bags account for around 40% of all the marine litter across UK waters and the North Sea <sup>2</sup>. In the Bay of Biscay most of the waste items found on the seabed were plastic (92%) and of those 94% were plastic bags<sup>3</sup>. In this respect over 30 NGOs are making a final call to EU Environment ministers ahead of the July 15 deadline for setting marine litter targets, as required under EU law.

The International Plastic Bag-Free Day <u>www.plasticbagfreeday.org</u> is organised by <u>GAIA</u>, <u>Zero</u> Waste Europe and the Fundació Catalana per la Prevenció de Residus i Consum.
